VERENA & MABUSA NR – 1 February

In the car, on the way, we discussed our targets: topping the list was Short-tailed Pipit and White-bellied Bustard. No one could have imagined that we would tick them off within the first half hour of our arrival. In fact, after Common Buzzard had welcomed us at the entry of the Verena road, and we had parked the cars to wait for the rest to arrive, there they were: a pair of small brown birds with the tell-tale white outer feathers to their very short tails – Short-tailed Pipits! They were enjoying the freshness after the previous night's rains and gave us all a magnificent display by zooming past, close by, at great speed, dropping down into the long grass, suddenly popping out again – but thankfully staying around until everyone had arrived, had had good views, and Fransie O' Brien, our leader, confirmed. High Fives!

That our next target would be seen so soon after, first seen flying near the ridge and then landing, seemed too good to be true: White-bellied Bustard! Though far away, and proper photographs almost impossible, a wonderful thrill.

Add to that a pair of Blue Cranes, beautiful displaying widowbirds of all four South African species, Black-chested Snake Eagle, Common House Martin, Orange-breasted Waxbill, Red-breasted - and South African Cliff Swallows and even a hooting Red-chested Flufftail – Verena more than delivered.

When we at last arrived at nearby Mabusa NR, the heatwave struck in full force and birding slowed down considerably. Brown Snake Eagle waited at the entrance, and later Common Buzzard and Wahlberg's Eagle soared above. A Short-toed Rock Thrush skittered away, but unfortunately, no Red-faced Cisticola was waiting at the first bridge. Fransie showed us where to look for the nesting Red-headed Weavers.





REGIONAL AND LOCAL RARITIES AND INTERESTING SIGHTINGS


Mkhombo Dam's shore flooded after excellent rains and a plethora of national and regional rare species departed. Then Zaagkuildrift stepped up to the plate and almost daily reports flooded in of a variety of crakes, warblers, bitterns and more.

BLNG members on an outing to Verena spotted **Short-tailed Pipits**, **White-bellied Bustard** and **Blue Cranes**.

Selwyn Rautenbach reported a **Montagu's Harrier** near Devon. **European Nightjars** were seen both in Rietondale and on the Magalies MBT Trail.
