CLUB MEETING – 7 September



Philip Calinikos took us all on a magic carpet ride through Costa Rica, where he and Amanda went on a birding trip with EcoTours. From beaches and estuaries to elevations of 3000 m, through high mist-belt and lowland tropical forests, they managed to record 284 species, of which Philip photographed close to 200. Brilliantly coloured Motmots, Tanagers, Macaws, Hummingbirds – each more spectacular than the previous. During the photography session, he shared information about his new mirrorless camera and lens used, as well as post-editing packages such as Nikon's. The results are astounding – especially as he shared a great many videos where we could see some weird habits and foraging methods of many species. Their tour ended with a nesting Resplendent Quetzal, one of the main target species, a bird which I would place as a cross between a Narina Trogon and an African Paradise Flycatcher with long streamers, flitting through the forest. 














BLSA unveiled the new logo at the BirdFair, honouring our national bird, the near-endemic Blue Crane.

As the day progressed, attendees could choose from a variety of workshops, covering topics from bird photography to garden-friendly landscaping, designed to attract birdlife.

Guest speakers inspired the audience with talks about conservation challenges and success stories, while local authors delighted fans with book readings and signings.

A highlight of the afternoon was the announcement of the winners of the 2025 Photography Competition, showcasing striking images of South Africa's diverse bird species.

Our club members joined the bird walks, enjoyed the stalls, and attended many of the talks. Angela represented BLNG at the Owl Awards.

Our heartfelt thanks must go out to the BLNG Ringers. Their live bird ringing demonstration drew particular interest, allowing visitors to see up close how researchers safely capture, tag, and release birds to study their movements and behaviour.

"It was such a treat to see bird ringing in action and to learn more about conservation," said one of the attendees. The ringers received a special mention the next day for their competence and professionalism in a Facebook post by John Kinghorn from BLSA.

This vibrant image of an African Stonechat is the Photograph of the Month. The dramatic black and white colouring is enhanced by the bright chestnut chest and flanks and offset by the complementing fresh mint green of the spring leaves. Two strong diagonal lines of the branches draw the eye to the most arresting part of this image – the prey in the beak and the glint in the eye of this characterful bird. Well done, Zak Croukamp!


